Colonization outlawed several forms of free expression


Native 2SLGBTQ+ are targeted more by big tobacco marketing (Source: Acosta-Deprez et all (2021))

BECAUSE OF THESE FACTORS:


Native people have higher rates of smoking compared to other ethnic groups (Source: CDC)

Two-Spirit individuals are

1.5 - 2.5X more likely

to smoke cigarettes than straight individuals (Source: Truth Initiative)

TWO-SPIRIT

a term exclusive to Native people that represents individuals of a wide range of gender roles, sexual orientation, and gender expression who carry significant cultural and spiritual roles across Indian Country.

2SLGBTQ+

an abbreviation used to identify two-spirit, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/ questioning, and additional gender identities and sexualities as a community.
